SIMPLE THINGS


Have you ever thought about the everyday opportunities God gives us to love, care for, and help people take those next steps in the Christlike life?



"We know that all things work together for the good of those who love God: those who are called according to His purpose." Romans 8:28 (HCSB)


When we regularly come alongside someone that needs help it creates a significant form of

Catalytic Converter Thefts Are On The Rise

Catalytic converter thefts are on the rise. Several Coosa County citizens and church's have been the victim of this over the last year. Catalytic converters – part of the exhaust system as an anti-pollution device – are popular theft items because of valuable metals inside, including platinum and rhodium. Recyclers pay \$50 to \$200 to legally obtain a failed converter, or one



from a junked vehicle. Rhodium is a rare metal that is used in automotive catalytic converters to meet strict emission norms and the price has surged over the past year. According to an NPR report, the price of rhodium has skyrocketed to about \$28,000 an ounce, though only a tiny fraction of that quantity — perhaps worth a few hundred dollars — goes inside each converter. Business with vehicles that have been targeted include churches, daycares, moving and storage companies, restaurants, assorted construction companies, as well as personal vehicles. It takes thieves less that 5 minutes to crawl under the vehicle and cut off the converters. Coosa County Sheriff's office has made several arrests this year, but there are still people coming into the county stealing converters. The Sheriff's Office, like many of the surrounding area departments, have considered using bait cars. One agency was able to catch them in the act as they were watching the bait car in the woods. The Deputy said "If these thieves know we're hiding in the woods watching, maybe they'll think twice before the next time they try to cut one out." Sheriff Michael Howell states "if you have any vehicles that are left unattended for extended amounts of time, you may want to utilize a camera system to help secure your property". He also states "Please report any suspicious activity to the Coosa County Sheriff's Office. If you see anything that seems out of place or unusual, please contact my office at (256) 377-4922".

Move Over

Listening to the news today, I learned two Alabama State Troopers had been injured this week by drivers who had failed to obey the move over law. A distracted driver can be deadly to anyone on the road. This is especially true for the law enforcement officer, EMS personnel, tow truck driver, highway worker, disabled motorist or pedestrian who may be standing on or alongside the road. I understand most people are inquisitive when they see blue, red or yellow lights on the side of the road. Although it is a natural response, drivers must resist the urge to stare and/or "rubberneck" when passing a traffic stop or accident.

Unfortunately, first responders being hit by automobiles is far too common. Many law enforcement officers are either struck by autos or have their vehicle hit by careless drivers. An officer with an agency in a neighboring county shared with me that he has had a vehicle's mirror strike the gun in his holster on different occasions during traffic stops. I have also had to jump out of the way of an oncoming vehicle more than once.

One night I was on the scene of a vehicle fire on Highway 280. The vehicle was off the highway on the shoulder of the road. The fire truck had just arrived and was parked in the fast lane. Our Sheriff's cruiser was approximately fifty yards behind the burning vehicle. We had our blue lights on and the fire truck had its red lights on. Fortunately, the firemen were still pulling the hose off the truck and had not approached it when a vehicle running at highway speed never let up and passed between the fire truck and burning vehicle. You can't make this stuff up!

Alabama's Move Over Law (32-5A-58.2) is an effort to save the lives of those who have to work along the roads of Alabama. Stated simply, when drivers approach any law enforcement vehicle, emergency vehicle, wrecker, utility service vehicle, vehicle displaying flashing lights, or garbage, trash, refuse, or recycling collection vehicle they should, on a four-lane road, move into the lane farthest from the emergency vehicle. If it is not safe to move over, the driver shall slow to a speed that is at least 15 miles per hour less than the posted speed limit unless otherwise directed by a law enforcement officer.

Don't be a part of the problem. When you see emergency lights, whether blue, red or yellow, SLOW DOWN and MOVE OVER! Remember, first responders put their lives on the line for you every day, please don't take it from them.

Sylacauga Man Arrested for Meth & Other Charges

A Sylacauga man was recently arrested on a drugrelated charge and three other charges during patrol. Sheriff Michael Howell reported that Cpl. Mike Rudd and Investigator Scott Hammond were investigating a case of unauthorized use of a vehicle. While on patrol, Rudd encountered a vehicle and ran its license plate.

The tag information came back indicating that vehicle was the one related to the case of unauthorized use. Rudd proceeded to make contact with the driver, 40-year-old James Keller Harmon III of Sylacauga.

Upon making contact with the driver off of County Road 183 in Weogufka, it was discovered that he had methamphetamine in his pocket. Additionally, Howell reported that Harmon gave the wrong name and date of birth to deputies because he had warrants out on him.

Ultimately, Harmon was arrested July 1 in the Weogufka area on charges of possession of a controlled substance and giving false information to law enforcement, as well as arrested for two warrants for failure to appear. His total bond was set at \$16,500, and as of press time he remained in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.

Sylacauga Man Arrested for Multiple Charges

A young man from Sylacauga was arrested on multiple charges, including a firearm-related charge and attempting to elude. Sheriff Michael Howell reported that on May 31 Cpl. Rudd and Investigator Hodge were patrolling County Road 29 when they encountered a vehicle driven by an individual for whom they had warrants.

Rudd turned around and attempted to stop the vehicle. However, the vehicle fled and eventually stopped at a residence.

A male got out of the vehicle and fled on foot. A gun with an altered serial number and a glass pipe were found inside the vehicle.

As previously reported, the female in the vehicle, 23-year-old Ashley Kilgore, was arrested at the time. The investigation also led to warrants being issued for 19-year-old Bradlee Gooden of Sylacauga.

On June 24, Gooden was arrested on the charges of possession of an altered firearm, possession of drug paraphernalia and attempting to elude law enforcement. Howell said that Gooden was also arrested for numerous warrants for failure to appear.

Gooden's total bond was set at \$14,500, and he has since been released on bond to await trial.

Sylacauga Man Arrested for Attempting to Eluge

A Sylacauga man was arrested for allegedly attempting to elude law enforcement, as well as a drug-related charge. According to Sheriff Michael Howell, Deputy Bradberry and a reserve deputy were on patrol on June 19 when they used radar to clock a speeding vehicle. Upon attempting to stop the vehicle, the driver reportedly pulled the vehicle into the Central Alabama Electric Cooperative parking lot in Rockford, pulled around to the back of the building and turned off the vehicle lights.

However, as the driver began attempting to back the vehicle out, Bradberry pulled in and was able to block the vehicle. The driver allegedly threw a box out of the vehicle, and deputies discovered that the box contained marijuana.

The driver, 43-year-old Nathan Allen Smith of Sylacauga, was arrested on the charges of attempting to elude law enforcement and first-degree possession of marijuana. The marijuana possession charge was elevated to first degree because of Smith having a prior conviction, according to Howell. Smith's total bond for both charges was set at \$10,000. He has since been released on bond to await trial.

Kellyton Man Arrested for Drugs & Harassment

A Kellyton man was arrested for a drug-related charge and harassment. Sheriff Michael Howell reported that Deputy Scott and a reserve deputy responded to a call of assault on County Road 85 on June 12. Upon their arrival at the scene, they made contact with 36-year-old Terry Kelly of Kellyton.

They conducted an investigation of the assault that had allegedly occurred there. That investigation culminated in the arrest of Kelly, who was charged with harassment.

While being patted down during the booking process at the county jail, law enforcement officers discovered synthetic marijuana in Kelly's pocket. He was then also charged with possession of a controlled substance.

His total bond for those two charges was set at \$5,500. As of press time he remained in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.

Fairhope Man Arrested for Theft from Equality Residence

A young man from Fairhope was arrested after allegedly stealing from an Equality residence. Sheriff Michael Howell reported that in May a report was filed with the Sheriff's Office in which the victim had people working at her home in Equality doing some remodeling. During that process, she reported that someone had stolen her wallet, which contained some debit and credit cards, from her home.

Further investigation identified 18-year-old Michael Uding, who was one of the individuals working at the home at the time, as a suspect.

Uding was arrested on June 14 on the charges of third-degree theft of property and fourth-degree theft of property. His total bond was set at \$7,500, and he has since been released on bond to await trial.

Tallassee Man Arrested for Drug Charge

A Tallassee man was arrested on a drug-related charge following a routine traffic stop. According to Sheriff Michael Howell, Deputy Ward was on routine patrol in the Equality area when he encountered a vehicle with a switched tag. Ward pulled the driver over and proceeded to conduct a search of the vehicle.

Inside the vehicle he found a crystal substance believed to be methamphetamine. Howell said the substance was tested and confirmed to be crystal meth.

His bond was set at \$10,000. As of press time he remained in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.

One of my favorites seasons of the year has arrived. When I was a student, I loved summer because it meant a break from school. I had summer jobs, plus I had to help with Mama's 100-acre garden, but I always managed to squeeze in some time for fishing and swimming. The older I get, the less I enjoy summer, but I do love another season that summer brings. With summer comes tomato season. There are few things I find more delightful, or that tickle my taste buds more, more than a big, ripe, red, homegrown tomato. We can go to a grocery store and buy tomatoes most any time of the year, even in the dead of winter. Even those that claim to have been "vine ripened" are obviously missing something...flavor. When those are the only ones

A few years ago, I told you about our raised tomato bed in the back yard. Between the backyard squirrels and the cutworms, that didn't turn out so well. 

The Yellow Dot Program

The "Yellow Dot" program is designed to assist Alabama citizens and first responders in the event of an automobile crash or other medical emergency involving the participant's vehicle. The program can help save lives during the critical "Golden Hour" by improving communication at a time when accident victims may be unable to communicate for themselves. Pick up a "Yellow Dot" folder here at the Sheriff's Office, have your photo taken and printed.

A "Yellow Dot" decal on the driver's side rear window of a vehicle alerts first responders to check in the glove compartment for the corresponding "Yellow Dot" folder. Having this information following a crash helps first responders positively identify the person, get in touch with family or emergency contacts and ensures that the person's current medications and pre-existing medical conditions are considered when treatment is administered for injuries.

Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver is a radio transmission system designed to assist law enforcement and rescue agencies in locating lost or missing persons who have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, or other disorders that may prohibit them from communicating personal information such as who they are or where they live. Project lifesaver can help provide peace of mind to caregivers. However, it does not replace the need for supervised care.

The transmitter is a small circular radio device on a wristband, approximately the size of a wristwatch. The transmitters and wristbands are worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and are difficult to remove without the appropriate tools. If the participant becomes lost or missing, the Sheriff's Office and emergency response services have specialized tracking equipment to help isolate the location of the transmitter the participant is wearing. The search will start from the last known location of the participant and work outward until the transmission signal is obtained. The goal is to determine the location of the signal in a quick, timely manner, minimizing the risk of harm to the loved one.

CCSO is proud to participate, along with the other agencies in Alabama, in this very worthy and worthwhile program; Sheriff Howell says this is another way we will live up to out motto, "To Serve and Protect" and he is extremely proud to offer this great service to Coosa County!

<u>Neighborhood Watch Program</u>

A citizen's involvement program where citizens, in cooperation with their local law enforcement agency, directly participate in the detection and prevention of crime. These citizens keep well informed about their neighborhood and of any suspicious, criminal or dangerous activities that may be occurring. Coosa County has five communities that participate with the CCSO in this program. Their meetings are scheduled every month, the dates and times are indicated.
