SHERIFF'S OFFICE WELCOMES NEW DEPUTY

With the new year, the Sheriff's Office is proud to officially announce and introduce its newest deputy, Trenton Davenport.

Sheriff Terry Wilson explained that on July 7, 2017, they hired a new deputy. However, he wanted to wait to inform everyone and introduce the new deputy to the public until after

the Police Academy was completed. At that time, the next academy wasn't until late August.

At the end of November, after a 13-week course of intensive training, Trenton Davenport graduated from the academy. It was one of the largest graduating groups from the Northeast Alabama Law Enforcement Academy of Jacksonville State University, with the group starting with 109 participants and ending with 89 graduating.

Following his graduation, Davenport underwent field training through December. He is now on deputy rotation, which started shortly before Christmas.

"We are proud to have Trent on board," Wilson said. "He brings to our department a fresh, new look to things. He brings youth and enthusiasm and hopefully some new ideas to our office. He hit the ground running and is off to a good start."

Davenport grew up in Columbiana and later moved to Sylacauga, where he worked at

Nemak. He had wanted to get into law enforcement and said Coosa County was a short drive away, which began his first step into law enforcement employment.

Davenport recalled that he was a bit of a "rough kid" while growing up, having an attitude and staying in some trouble, though nothing too bad.

A deputy invited him to participate in Explorers
Camp, which is Law
Enforcement Exploring.
He said this was a type of law enforcement training for young people.

He said he participated in the one-week academy offered through Explorers. He started this when he was 15 or 16 years old and said that he did it for two to three years.

This gave him a taste in law enforcement and helped ignite his desire for working in law enforcement.

However, Davenport said his grandmother was the one who primarily raised him. When he lost her in October of 2013, he said he lost his way and lost his interest in law enforcement.

Instead, he worked odd jobs and continued working in other fields to pay the bills. While working in Sylacauga, he learned of the corrections officer job at the Coosa County Sheriff's Office.

He decided to apply, and this led to his first interview with Capt. Mike Mull and second interview with Sheriff Wilson. He said those went well, and in 2016 he was hired as a corrections officer and dispatcher.

This job as a corrections officer reignited his passion for law enforcement and helped him to find his way again. He worked in that area for almost a year prior to being hired as the newest deputy.

"I get to see and experience all three sides of it," Davenport said.

Through his work as a corrections officer, he was able to learn and get familiar with how the jail operates, and as a dispatcher he was able to learn what transpires when individuals call in and how to dispatch deputies as needed. Now he gets to experience what occurs on the deputy side after being dispatched and with handling other cases.

Concerning how this prior experience has helped him in his new role as a deputy,

Davenport said, "It has helped tremendously, because as a dispatcher you learn to control your emotions because you have distraught people calling and have to handle those situations."

Davenport said working as a dispatcher also helped him get to know the people of the communities.

"When you're wearing that [Sheriff's Office] star, you see and learn how much people love the sheriff, and that love trickles down to us," he said.

As a dispatcher, he also rode along with deputies to get to know the roads and areas of the county better. However, he said doing this while working as a dispatcher offered limited availability for ride-alongs, and he also wanted to be able to back his partner up if needed, which he said is hard to do when unarmed.

Therefore, he joined the Sheriff's Office reserves, serving as a volunteer reserve deputy in that capacity. He said this was a good experience and opportunity for him.

Davenport said he loves community policing. He added that the sheriff taught him, "Embrace the community, and they will embrace you."

With his grandmother's passing in 2013 and him beginning work in law enforcement with Coosa County in 2016, Davenport felt that the job gave him something he needed besides work.

"Being a small Sheriff's Office, it's like a family, and that's really what I needed at that time," he said.

Davenport said the public has also been very welcoming. The first Neighborhood Watch meeting he attended was in Richville, and he said they were very welcoming and supportive.

While he is not from Coosa County, he said he is planting his roots in Hanover and is in the process of getting settled in there.

He graduated from Shelby County High School in 2013 and then graduated from the law enforcement academy in late November 2017.

Davenport, 22 years old, and his fiancée, Cierra Wynn, have one newborn child, 1-month-old Kaylynn Davenport.

Davenport said he wants his daughter to grow up in a church and have that church family, especially since he did not. Therefore, he is thinking about joining Rockford Baptist Church, adding to planting his roots in Coosa County.

"I want the people of Coosa County to know we're here for them," Davenport said. "I thank them for their support and welcoming me with open arms."

"We welcome him, and we hope the public will welcome him, as well," Sheriff Wilson said. "He is a bright young man and will do his best to help everyone."

Driving Impaired

Influenza has shown up with a vengeance across our state and across the country this year. Sadly, many have succumbed to this year's virulent flu strain. News reports and public service announcements are continually reminding people to wash their hands regularly and to avoid crowds. I would like to address an additional flu concern.



A few days ago, I was traveling east on highway 280 when I observed a vehicle whose driver was having a difficult time maintaining their lane. The driver repeatedly crossed the center line and ran onto the shoulder of the road several times. My first thought was the driver was likely texting. Whatever the problem was, the driver was definitely a hazard to everyone on the road.

I activated my blue lights and the driver pulled to the side of the road. I approached the driver who had his license in hand. I immediately noticed the man's glassy eyes and red nose. Before I said anything the man hoarsely stated, "I have the flu." Unfortunately, I had already taken his license from him. I returned to my truck and coated my hands with hand sanitizer. The license was valid. I returned to the man. While keeping my distance, I told the man he was all over the road and he replied he was very sick. I asked if he felt he should be driving and he replied, "no." He stated he was only a few miles from his destination.

Obviously when we hear of an impaired driver we normally think of someone under the influence of alcohol or illicit drugs. As this instance shows folks can be impaired by properly using prescription drugs or simply by having their health compromised by illness. The bottom line is that if anyone is impaired, no matter what the cause, they

Troopers Investigate 23 Traffic Fatalities During 17-day Holiday Travel Period

Alabama State Troopers investigated 23 traffic deaths during the Christmas and New Year's Day holiday travel period, which was from

12:01 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 16, 2017, to midnight Monday, Jan. 1, 2018.

The total is significantly lower than the total from the same period in 2016, when Troopers investigated 31 traffic fatalities.

The fatal traffic crashes occurred in Autauga, Baldwin, Calhoun, Choctaw, Colbert, Coosa, Crenshaw, Cullman, Dallas, DeKalb, Escambia, Geneva, Limestone, Mobile, Russell, St. Clair, Shelby, and Washington counties.

Those killed were 16 drivers, four passengers, two pedestrians, and one bicyclist. Of those who died in these traffic crashes, 20 were traveling in vehicles equipped with seat belts, but 11 of them were not using them. Nothing further on these crashes is available as Troopers continue to investigate.

Troopers did see five zero-fatality days during this holiday travel period – including Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

In addition, Troopers wrapped up 2017 with fewer traffic fatality investigations than the previous year. In 2017, Troopers investigated 598 traffic deaths, which was 73 fewer than 2016's 671 traffic deaths.

Still, the motoring public is encouraged to drive responsibly: Buckle up, obey speed limits, avoid driving under the influence of alcohol/ drugs, and avoid driving when distracted. Do pay attention to the task of driving, and

Please keep in mind that the numbers referenced above are only crashes investigated by Alabama State Troopers.





Sylacauga Woman Arrested for Burglary Cases

Two separate theft cases on two consecutive days, one in the Richville area and one in the Weogufka community, culminated in the arrest of a Sylacauga woman and warrants issued for a second suspect.

On January 4, the Sheriff's Office took a report for theft of property in the Richville area. The next day, the office took a report for third-degree burglary and thirddegree theft of property in the Weogufka area.

During the initial investigation, evidence was obtained from a game camera. After reviewing this evidence, law enforcement officers identified two suspects. Evidence also led to officers finding some of the allegedly stolen property at Top Dollar Recycling in Sylacauga. There, a box blade was recovered. An air compressor and electric stove that had reportedly been stolen were not recovered.

Upon reviewing all evidence, deputies discovered that the same two suspects were involved in both the Richville and Weogufka cases.

Kelly Diane Smith, 35 years old of Sylacauga, was arrested on January 5 for third-degree burglary, third-degree theft of property and fourth-degree theft of property. Her bond was set at a total of \$26,500, and remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.

Warrants were obtained for the second suspect on the same three charges.

Second Suspect Arrested in Burglary

As reported, two separate theft cases were reported on two consecutive days, January 4 and 5, in the Richville and Weogufka communities.

At that time, a Sylacauga woman was arrested on three charges in connection with the two cases, and warrants had been issued for a second suspect.

The Coosa County Sheriff's Office has since arrested the second suspect in those cases, 42-year-old Justin Wade Ward of Alabaster.

Justin Wade Ward Ward was arrested January 10, on warrants for third-degree theft of property, fourth-degree theft of property and third-degree burglary. His bonds were set at a total of \$35,000, and he remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.



Weogufka Woman Arrested for Stolen Property &

A Weogufka woman was arrested on one felony and one misdemeanor charge following a traffic stop in the Weogufka community. On January 13, a traffic stop was performed on Coosa County Road 41. Deputies ran information on the subjects in the vehicle and found that one of them had a warrant in Talladega County.

After discovering one individual had a warrant on her, deputies searched the vehicle and came upon a small caliber firearm in the subject's purse.

Firearm Charges

Deputies then ran the firearm through the national database and discovered it had been stolen from Coosa County. It was further determined that it was one of the firearms allegedly stolen from the All-in-One Exxon in Kellyton on November 16.



April Dawn Butler Salter

At that time, 38-year-old April Dawn Butler Salter of Weogufka was arrested for second-degree receiving stolen property and carrying a concealed weapon. Receiving stolen property is a felony charge, while carrying a concealed weapon without a permit is a misdemeanor.

Her bond was set at a total of \$12,000. She remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.

Programs Offered by... Coosa County Sheriff's Office

The Yellow Dot Program

The "Yellow Dot" program is designed to assist Alabama citizens and first responders in the event of an automobile crash or other medical emergency involving the participant's vehicle. The program can help save lives during the critical "Golden Hour" by improving communication at a time when accident victims may be unable to communicate for themselves. Pick up a "Yellow Dot" folder here at the Sheriff's Office, have your photo taken and printed.

A "Yellow Dot" decal on the driver's side rear window of a vehicle alerts first responders to check in the glove compartment for the corresponding "Yellow Dot" folder. Having this information following a crash helps first responders positively identify the person, get in touch with family or emergency contacts and ensures that the person's current medications and pre-existing medical conditions are considered when treatment is administered for injuries.

Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver is a radio transmission system designed to assist law enforcement and rescue agencies in locating lost or missing persons who have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, or other disorders that may prohibit them from communicating personal information such as who they are or where they live. Project lifesaver can help provide peace of mind to caregivers. However, it does not replace the need for supervised care.

The transmitter is a small circular radio device on a wristband, approximately the size of a wristwatch. The transmitters and wristbands are worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and are difficult to remove without the appropriate tools. If the participant becomes lost or missing, the Sheriff's Office and emergency response services have specialized tracking equipment to help isolate the location of the transmitter the participant is wearing. The search will start from the last known location of the participant and work outward until the transmission signal is obtained. The goal is to determine the location of the signal in a quick, timely manner, minimizing the risk of harm to the loved one.

CCSO is proud to participate, along with the other agencies in Alabama, in this very worthy and worthwhile program; Sheriff Wilson says this is another way we will live up to out motto, "To Serve and Protect" and he is extremely proud to offer this great service to Coosa County!

<u>Neighborhood Watch Program</u>

A citizen's involvement program where citizens, in cooperation with their local law enforcement agency, directly participate in the detection and prevention of crime. These citizens keep well informed about their neighborhood and of any suspicious, criminal or dangerous activities that may be occurring. Coosa County has five communities that participate with the CCSO in this program. Their meetings are scheduled every month, the dates and times are indicated.
