A.W. Tozer wrote many years ago: "An entire generation of Christians have come up believing that it is possible to 'accept' Christ without forsaking the world."

This nothing more.

They sold their possessions and property and distributed the proceeds to all, as anyone had a need. Every day they devoted themselves [to meeting] together in the temple complex, and broke bread from house to house. They ate their food with a joyful and humble attitude, praising God and having favor with all the people. And every day the Lord added to them those who were being saved." (Acts 2:41-47 HCSB)

Take note these believers were fulfilling a purpose. They were sharing the Gospel, spending time in fellowship with others and studying the Word of God together, meeting the needs of those around them, and in worship to God. This is a picture of what the church must do today! As followers of Christ, living in communion with other believers, doing the work of Christ; we are the church. # Sheriff's Office Featured Article

## **CELL PHONE SAFETY**

Cellphones are increasingly full-blown handheld computers, and everything that can be done on the Web via computer – photo-sharing, Web browsing, game playing, tune -swapping, real-time text or video chat, and (oh yeah) talking – can be done on a phone. With this fact comes the reality of problems associated with the use of cellphones.

Cell phone theft is a major problem in metropolitan and urban areas around the nation. Many living in the rural areas might not think too much of a risk exists yet there is the potential to anyone at anytime, anywhere.

The following article reported by WKRG out of Mobile, Alabama from September 25, 2017 shows the extremes individuals will extend to sell a cellphone:



"Mobile Police have arrested a man who advertises on Facebook of a cell phone for sale – usually an iPhone 7. Darren Penn tells the buyers to meet him in the Stanton Road area. When he takes out money to purchase the cell phone, Penn snatches the money and runs.

Penn has used various Facebook accounts such as Montana Da Dee, Monie RichForever, and RichForever Dee.

Investigation reveals Penn has committed numerous thefts in this manner over the past week. Police are attempting to locate additional victims."

Unattended phones or snatching the phone from the users hand and running is typically the MO to stolen cellphones. The stolen phones are then sold on the black market. A cell phone's

resale value can range from \$100 - \$300.

Using your phone in public makes you much more vulnerable to being robbed or assaulted. Pay attention to what's going on around you and who is near you. Always be aware of your surroundings. Have a friend or family member stand close and help keep an eye on your surroundings if you are going to need to be in very deep conversations.

It is a dangerous practice to hold your phone in your hand while shopping or browsing the mall. Make it hard for someone to snatch your phone. Keep your phone in your pocket, bag or in a phone pouch, not in your hand where someone can quickly grab it from you.

Keep your phone close to you. Do not leave it on a table, desk or counter in a public place unattended – even for a few seconds.

Use a password to protect your phone. It will make it more difficult for a thief to use your phone or access the information you have stored on it. Do not store any information on your phone that you wouldn't want others to have (e.g. bank and credit card online passwords, personal information, etc.). Your cell phone provider may disable the phone remotely if it's stolen or lost. Back up the information on your cell phone. Most cell phone companies offer backup assistance through their phone plans. You may be able to back up your phone data on you home computer as well. Download an "anti-theft" application. If your phone is lost or stolen you might be able to locate it, "wipe it" (i.e. remove the data from the phone) or make the phone unusable to the thief. Contact you cell phone provider for more detailed information.

Keep a written record of any of your



electronic device's serial numbers in a safe place. Make note of those numbers when filing a police report; they are cross referenced with the Pawn System. FILE A REPORT.

Additionally, it is also important to take a few moments to consider a few things related to cellphone use:

#### Keep it kind.

Because people socialize on cellphones as much as online, cyberbullying can be mobile too. Treat people on phones and the Web the way you would in person, and the risk of being bullied goes down. Be aware, too, of people randomly taking pictures at parties, in locker rooms, etc. – you may not want to be tagged in their social-network photo albums!

#### Share with care.

Use the same good sense about what you post from your phone as from a computer. Once they're posted, text, photos, and video are tough to take back, can be copied and pasted elsewhere, and are up there pretty much forever.

#### Be Careful with Children's Pictures.

You are proud of your grandchild, you want to keep pictures on your phone, post on social media, even text pictures to friends in distant states. Often a picture from a lake trip or bath time for a small child might end up being sent into can significantly increase the risk of a crash or the cyberworld. They can be subjected to jokes, bullying, blackmail, expulsion from school, loss of a job, etc. and the images can circulate forever. Just don't go there. Think about the people in them (including you!). Reputations are at stake.

#### Share location mindfully.

A growing number of apps allow friends to pinpoint each other's physical location. If you use such a service, do so only with friends you know in person, and get to know the service's privacy features.

#### Know what your apps know.

Pay attention to any permissions apps request as you install them. If an app asks to access your location, contact list, calendar or messages or to post to your social networking services, consider if the app really needs that information to function. When in doubt, consider withholding permission or not using that app.

#### Down time is good.

Constant texting and talking can affect sleep, concentration, school, and other things that deserve your thought and focus. You need your sleep, and real friends understand there are times you just need to turn off the phone.

#### Have a conversation

(not a lecture) with your kids about smartphone use. Consider drawing up a family cellphone contract and talk with your children about why each point is important (there's a sample contract at ConnectSafely.org/mobile). If you decide to use parental-control apps, discuss them with your children.

#### No texting while driving!

Research shows that texting while driving

near-crash situation. Silence your phone in the car, pull over if you need to use it, and of course follow your state's hands-free laws for mobile phones in cars.

#### Phones are personal.

Letting other people use your phone when you're not around is like letting them have the password to your social network profile. They can impersonate you, which gives them the power to mess with your reputation and relationships. Lock your phone when you're not using it, and use strong and unique passwords for all your apps.

Be safe, be wise, be aware.

#### ALABAMA MAN KILLED AFTER TRACKING STOLEN CELL PHONE WITH APP

(Reuters) - An Alabama man who used a computer app to track down his stolen cell phone was shot and killed when he tried to retrieve it from the suspected thief, police said on Monday.

The 23-year-old victim's phone was stolen from his car in Fairfield, Alabama, a suburb of Birmingham, said Fairfield Police Chief Leon Davis.

The tracking app led the victim to a church parking lot near Miles College late on Sunday, Davis said.

The man is believed to have "arrived on the scene and hit a button on the app that made the phone ring inside a vehicle," the police chief said in an interview. "When he went to retrieve the phone inside the vehicle, the suspect shot and killed him."

The victim and the shooter apparently knew each other, Davis said. The suspect has not been arrested but police have "very good leads" as to his identity, he added.

The case illustrates the danger of people trying to apprehend cell phone thieves on their own with the help of tracking apps, Davis said.

"Notify police and let them handle the recovering," he said.

## Are You Prepared?

Harvey, Irma, Jose and Maria have made themselves known during the past month. Saying the hurricane season is here is a gross understatement. Many people have lost almost everything and the storms keep coming. By most accounts we got off easy only catching the remnants of Hurricane Irma. The next time we may not be so fortunate. Are you prepared?

For the most part folks in the south are a self-reliant group. A few years back I was shocked at the news reports after Hurricane Sandy hit New York City. What surprised me was that one day after the storm hit



city residents were all over the news lamenting about not having any food to eat. Thinking about the contents of my kitchen cabinets and refrigerator it was a little hard for me to fathom folks running out of food in one day.

Thinking about it, I understand many New York City residents live in apartments and likely don't have a lot of storage area or a freezer. However, it surprised me to learn that many of the city dwellers purchase their food for the day every day.

While we don't normally incur much damage from hurricanes, obviously there are exceptions; it is not uncommon for us to lose power for a day or more. Are you prepared for that? There are several items we should each have in place in case of a power outage. These items include but are limited to: Multiple flashlights and extra batteries. A three-day supply of water and food. A battery powered radio. A basic first aid kit. A seven-day supply of prescription medicine. Some emergency cash and some extra gasoline. In addition, you should have sufficient supplies to care for infants, the elderly, and pets. Being prepared often simply means thinking ahead.

## Sheriff's Office Arrests Three in Goodwater Drug Bust

Three individuals from Goodwater were recently arrested on drug-related charges when deputies followed-up on a call concerning certain individuals possibly being at the residence. On September 15, the Coosa County Sheriff's Office was informed through an officer with the Alexander City Police Department who provided information concerning two suspects that had active warrants out of Alexander City



and were at a residence in Goodwater. It was also reported that there was drug activity at the residence at that time and date.

After following up with information received, deputies went to the residence at 60 Coosa Street in Goodwater and made contact with a white male subject, Furniss Casey Muckenfuss.

After making contact with Muckenfuss, deputies asked him if the individuals with warrants on them were in the residence. He confirmed that they were.

At that time, deputies entered the residence and arrested one person with warrants from Alexander City Police Department. A controlled substance was also seen in the residence.

After talking with six individuals in the residence, three individuals were arrested on drug charges.

Those arrested were 31-year-old Crystalea Joiner, 34-year-old Kimberly Denise Griebel and 30-year-old Muckenfuss, all of Goodwater.


All three were arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance. Bonds were set at \$25,000 for each of them.

All three individuals remained in custody at the Coosa County Jail in Rockford awaiting trial.

The one individual with warrants was arrested and turned over to the Alexander City Police Department.

#### Mt. Olive Man Arrested for Firearm Possession

A Mt. Olive man was arrested for illegally being in possession of a firearm.

On August 16, the Coosa County Sheriff's Office received information that led to investigating an alleged convicted felon who was selling firearms in Coosa County. While conducting the initial investigation, it was confirmed that the individual is a verifiable convicted felon.

Further investigation of the individual led to obtaining a search warrant, which was served August 25 at the individual's residence in the Mt. Olive area.

While law enforcement officers were executing the search warrant, firearms were found and seized from the Mt. Olive residence.


William Edward Messing, 35 years old, was then arrested for possession of a firearm by a violent felon.

His bond was set at \$5,000, and he has since been released on bond to await trial.

## Sylacauga Man Arrested on Three Drug-Related Charges

A Sylacauga man was arrested on three drug-related charges during a theft investigation.

On September 2, a deputy was called to a residence on County Road 29 in the Weogufka community. The call was in reference to items allegedly being missing from the residence. The deputy arrived and learned that the theft suspect was still at the residence. At that time, he went into the residence to speak with the person of interest.

During the course of the investigation, 48-year-old William Christopher Butler of Sylacauga was located. He was found to be in possession of marijuana, drug paraphernalia and ice, or crystal methamphetamine. Butler was immediately taken into custody without incident. He was charged with possession of a controlled substance, second-degree possession of marijuana and second-degree possession of drug paraphernalia.

His bond was set at a total of \$9,000. This includes a \$5,000 bond for possession of a controlled substance and bonds of \$2,000 for each of his other two charges. It was also discovered that Butler has outstanding warrants in Talladega County.

He remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail in Rockford to await trial. Talladega County has placed a hold on him so that once he is released from Coosa County, he will be transported to Talladega County for those outstanding warrants.

## $^{14}$ Weogufka Man Arrested for Burglary

A man from the Weogufka area was arrested on charges relating to a burglary case from July. On July 17, 2017, the Sheriff's Office took a report for burglary and theft from a residence in the Weogufka area. At that time, the victim stated that someone went into his house and got \$700 in cash.

The victim provided the name of the suspect. Further investigation led to identifying 32-year-old James Earl Fleming as the suspect.

Fleming was arrested September 21 for third-degree burglary and third-degree theft of property. His bond was set at a total of \$6,000, and he remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail.

### **Rockford Man Arrested for 2014 Firearms Theft Case**

A man from the Rockford area was arrested by the Sheriff's Office in connection to a 2014 firearms theft case after having served time out of state.

On October 2, 2014, the Coosa County Sheriff's Office took a report of the theft of three firearms from a Rockford residence. The suspect was immediately identified, and warrants were obtained.

On October 20, 2014, the Sheriff's Office received a call from West Virginia State Troopers. The troopers had initiated a traffic stop where the suspect eluded them

They eventually found the vehicle abandoned and found one firearm from the Coosa County theft case in the vehicle. On the same day, they also found the subject walking alongside a roadway. They made contact with him and found the two additional firearms from the Coosa case on his person.

At that time, 42-year-old Floyd Franklin Smith Jr. of Rockford was taken into police custody in West Virginia. After further investigation, Smith confessed to stealing the three firearms from Coosa County. He was held in West Virginia on multiple charges there for the past two years.


After being released from West Virginia, on September 18, 2017, the Coosa County Sheriff's Office arrested Smith on September 18, 2017, for second-degree theft of property. His bond was set at \$5,000, and he remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail.

All three firearms were recovered and returned to Coosa County.

## Coosa Man Arrested for Sex Offender Registration Notification Act (SORNA) Violation

A Coosa County man living right at the county line was arrested for violating the Sex Offender Registration Notification Act. On September 22, Nathaniel Matthews of Coosa County near the Titus area, specifically off of Coosa County roads 60 and 29 near the Elmore County line, was arrested for a SORNA violation of not registering and not notifying the Sheriff's Office of his residence change.

During an investigation into Matthews having not shown up for his scheduled August quarterly registration date, it was discovered that he had changed his place of residence. Reportedly, Matthews was actually living off of Alabama Highway 22 near the Chilton County line.

Matthews, 61 years old, was arrested and placed in the Coosa County Jail for this SORNA violation. He is currently out of jail on a \$5,000 bond to await trial.

Matthews was originally convicted of first-degree sexual abuse of a 10-year-old girl when he was first placed on the list of registered sex offenders.

It's homecoming season in East Central Alabama. No, I'm not talking about an annual football game when the home team schedules a visiting team whom they know they can whip by at least 348 points. I am talking about a church event when members, and former members, come to church for one special day with the ones still there. As the director of a Baptist association of churches, I normally have the privilege of attending several of these events each year. Sometimes I am the guest speaker, or the special singer, and sometimes I am just the special eater. These events almost always include a meal with enough food to feed an entire college football team for the next couple of months! Sometimes they have singing after the meal. One reason they do this is so everyone can

sit down and let their lunch settle and we don't have to crawl to our cars!

These meals are usually pot luck affairs. In case you are not from the south, this means that each person brings whatever dish they wish, with no coordinating of the meal. Sometimes the host church will provide the meat, which normally consists of fried chicken. These pot-luck meals will work everywhere in the south, except for the southern part of Louisiana. Without some planning there, they may end up with about 356 bowls of red beans and rice! I'm always amazed at how these things work in Alabama. There will always be cornbread dressing, with cranberry sauce. Up north, they call this stuff stuffing, but the only turkey we stuff down here is ourselves! There will be the normal vegetables, baked beans with hamburger meat, and sweet potato casserole. Panic erupts if there are three or four plates-full of deviled eggs and at least two of pear salad. You can't buy food as good as this in any cafe.

Back in the day, we had "dinner on the ground." There was none of this eating in the church-house stuff back then. Most churches had a concrete-slab table, out by the cemetery, approximately the length of the U.S.S. Alabama. The cement those things were made of was rougher than a chert road after a hard gully-washer. We kids learned to never use those tables for home base when playing freeze tag after church. If you accidently fell into the edge of one of those tables, you could be scared for life – maybe even lose a limb! This was back in the time before churches had enclosed fellowship halls (which sounds better than mess halls), or family life centers (which sounds better than a gym with a kitchen).

I knew a couple of ole boys who owned a road construction company when they were young men. We'll call them the Wilson brothers. The brothers traveled all across the state and were often away from home for days at a time. This was back when churches ate their meals outside,



with the heat, the wind, the ants, the flies, and... the Wilson brothers. That's because when the Wilson boys were out of town, most places were closed on Sundays and there was hardly any place to eat out. When they happened by a church having "dinner on the ground," they stopped in for lunch and hoped most folks would assume they were someone's third cousin from Arkansas.

Quite honestly, there aren't many things we should enjoy more than worshipping God with

family and old friends and then enjoying a nice meal together, whether it's on the ground or in the house, but please don't bring finger-sandwiches or store-bought deserts!

## Programs Offered by Coosa County Sheriff's Office

## **The Yellow Dot Program**

The "Yellow Dot" program is designed to assist Alabama citizens and first responders in the event of an automobile crash or other medical emergency involving the participant's vehicle. The program can help save lives during the critical "Golden Hour" by improving communication at a time when accident victims may be unable to communicate for themselves. Pick up a "Yellow Dot" folder here at the Sheriff's Office, have your photo taken and printed.

A "Yellow Dot" decal on the driver's side rear window of a vehicle alerts first responders to check in the glove compartment for the corresponding "Yellow Dot" folder. Having this information following a crash helps first responders positively identify the person, get in touch with family or emergency contacts and ensures that the person's current medications and pre-existing medical conditions are considered when treatment is administered for injuries.

## Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver is a radio transmission system designed to assist law enforcement and rescue agencies in locating lost or missing persons who have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, or other disorders that may prohibit them from communicating personal information such as who they are or where they live. Project lifesaver can help provide peace of mind to caregivers. However, it does not replace the need for supervised care.

The transmitter is a small circular radio device on a wristband, approximately the size of a wristwatch. The transmitters and wristbands are worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and are difficult to remove without the appropriate tools. If the participant becomes lost or missing, the Sheriff's Office and emergency response services have specialized tracking equipment to help isolate the location of the transmitter the participant is wearing. The search will start from the last known location of the participant and work outward until the transmission signal is obtained. The goal is to determine the location of the signal in a quick, timely manner, minimizing the risk of harm to the loved one.

CCSO is proud to participate, along with the other agencies in Alabama, in this very worthy and worthwhile program; Sheriff Wilson says this is another way we will live up to out motto, "To Serve and Protect" and he is extremely proud to offer this great service to Coosa County!

## <u>Neighborhood Watch Program</u>

A citizen's involvement program where citizens, in cooperation with their local law enforcement agency, directly participate in the detection and prevention of crime. These citizens keep well informed about their neighborhood and of any suspicious, criminal or dangerous activities that may be occurring. Coosa County has five communities that participate with the CCSO in this program. Their meetings are scheduled every month, the dates and times are indicated.
