He Hears By Prayers

We are discussing the seven promises of God and today we are reminded God hears our prayers. He promised...

A pastor friend was posting regarding this subject just recently:

“Things that drive this preacher crazy...people that ask privately to pray for them, but they post things publicly that are laced with vulgarity and filth.”

He explained his thought:

“I can and I will pray for you, but what will get you further with God will be your own prayers that come from a fully surrender life to Christ. You will be amazed at what He can do in your life. You might also discover that He has a better plan than what you wanted. My prayers are not some magic potion that can get you your will. I’m told to pray for God’s will.”

Read and listen to the words of the Psalmist:

“I love the LORD because He has heard my appeal for mercy.

Because He has turned His ear to me, I will call [out to Him] as long as I live.” **(Psalm 116:1-2 HCSB)**

The Word tells us that He promised to hear us. Someone might say: “It’s as if He’s turned a deaf ear to me.” Another might say: “I’m beginning to wonder if it’s even worthwhile

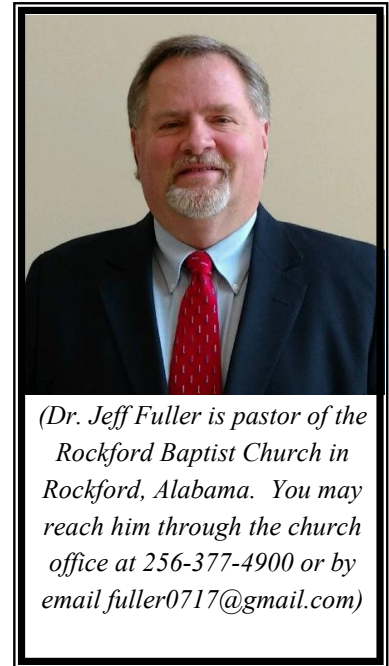
praying.” He hears my prayers. Even if He does not always answer the way we think He should, He still hears us.

habit. Anything we allow to pollute our souls, anything contrary to God's will and way in our lives, anything which blocks or blinds the presence of God from our lives will stop up the conduit and bring pain as we feel the heavens closed to us.

This is the reason we have made sure that we have given all to Jesus. Just singing "I surrender all," is not enough. Just attending "church services" on Sunday is not enough. Just reading our favorite Bible verse will not do it. He wants all of us; our entire being. He wants total submission. Our entire life. Because He came to cleanse us of sin and prepare us for eternity with Him.

Another reason we may not be getting answers to our prayers is because He love us. That is the best way to say it. Your prayers may not being answered because He loves you and because He love us and He knows what is best for us, we will wait on His will. We have the tendency to believe that because we asked the answer will always be "YES." Too many treat prayer as a "magic potion." Yet, sometimes the answer is not the way we envisioned it to be. 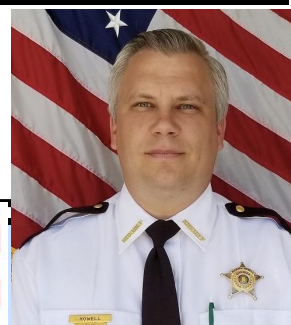

On September 13, 2020 the Coosa County Sheriff's Office received a call from a resident in the Ray Community about possible human remains found on their property. The Deputies arrived on the scene at approximately 11:33 am and immediately dispatched the Sheriff, Chief Deputy, and Criminal Investigators. Upon arrival, the area was secured, and they began the investigation. The Investigators processed the scene and confirmed unidentified human remains had been found. The Coosa County Coroner was dispatched to the scene to assess the victim, and later the victim was transported to the Alabama Department of Forensic Sciences. On September 21, 2020 The Coosa County Sheriff's Office posted a updated press release notifying the public that the remains had been identified as Bradley Jackson Sanford. According to Sheriff Michael Howell, Jackson was a 36-year old white male that had been missing from the Alexander City, Alabama area. The Alabama Forensic Department of Science helped confirmed the identity of the body. Sheriff Howell states, "We have no further information at this time due to this is an ongoing investigation." If the public has any information about this case, please contact the Coosa County Sheriff's Office.

Sad and Scary Times

If you do not know that this is a tough time to be a law enforcement officer, then you need to get out from under the rock where you've been living! As I watch the news today, Two Sheriff's Deputies in Los Angeles California are clinging to life after having been ambushed while seated in their marked vehicle. While that is tragic and troubling, what happened after they were taken to the hospital makes me want to throw up. "Protesters" showed up at the hospital and were saying they hope the officers die and telling officers there that they are next.



We need to keep in mind that these officers were sitting in their vehicle. They were ambushed simply because they were law enforcement officers. Not because of any activity they were taking part in. That should get the attention of every citizen. Elements of our society have launched an all-out deadly assault on law and order. We, in our rural area, are fortunate we have not witnessed this type of activity. However, we should be outraged that this is occurring anywhere. Do we think it will not happen here? Think again.

I would assume most folks likely watch the news at some point during the day or night. If so, it is likely you have seen the slanted view being pushed by the media. It would be laughable if it wasn't so sad and serious. It is unbelievable to me that CNN will show a graphic of a city on fire with the headline that it is mostly peaceful protesters. The hundreds of people who have lost their businesses and those who have lost their lives would likely beg to differ!

Some politicians have unfortunately embraced this riotous activity and refuse to condemn it. They have gone so far to say they are proud of those who resist arrest and cause havoc in the streets. How do you think that makes a law enforcement officer feel? Think about it.

With the attitude of the media today, it is doubtful that the full story is ever disclosed. Recently there have been protests over the death of a man in custody in New York. The media portrayed the incident as if it had just occurred which incited folks to riot. The truth is the officer's actions had been reviewed and it was determined the proper protocol was strictly followed. Evidently, that is irrelevant. That's sad.

Negative sentiment and hostility such as is being displayed at the hospital in California takes a toll on law enforcement. This is evident in the overwhelming number of officers that are leaving

the profession. You combine the departure of these seasoned officers with the push in many areas to defund the police and I feel the end result is going to be catastrophic.

The media wants people to believe police misconduct is happening everywhere. The truth of the matter is that most law-abiding citizens never interact with law enforcement. In addition, most contact with law enforcement is initiated by the citizen who calls for assistance. It is important to understand this especially in the face of people calling for the defunding of the police. It will be a sad day when folks in the defunded areas call 911 and reach a recording. Recently two billboards were erected visible to drivers entering Austin, Texas. They warn folks to enter at their own risk since the Austin Police are being defunded. That's sad and scary.

I would ask that if you appreciate law enforcement, you let them know. A kind word of support goes a long way. Especially now.

Recent News

Man & Woman Arrested on Drug Charges

A man and woman were arrested earlier this month on drug-related charges, which further led to the woman being arrested for an unrelated charge in another case.

Sheriff Michael Howell reported that on September 13, Deputy Ward was patrolling the area of U.S. Highway 280 and Hatchet Creek bridge when he conducted a traffic stop and found two individuals, 36-year-old Christopher Teer of Jasper and 34-year-old Shellie McClellan of Sylacauga.

Ward ran their information and discovered that Teer had a probation revocation from Walker County. He attempted to place Teer under arrest, but he fled the scene on foot before getting into a kayak on Hatchet Creek and floating downstream.

Ward stayed with McClellan, and upon talking to her and conducting a search, he found methamphetamine, a syringe, marijuana, and credit/debit cards in her possession.

That resulted in McClellan's arrest on September 13 on the charges of two counts of possession of a controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia and second-degree possession of marijuana.

Her total bond for those four drug-related charges was set at \$12,500. She remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail.

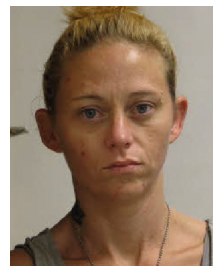
Teer was arrested later the same day on the charges of fleeing or attempting to elude law enforcement, two counts of possession of a controlled substance, second-degree possession of marijuana, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

His total bond for all five charges was set at \$16,000. He remained in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.

Additionally, following this incident with the victim's card being found in her possession, McClellan was arrested two days later on the charge of illegal possession of a credit card in connection with a separate case.

Childersburg Man Arrest For Identity Theft

A Childersburg man was recently arrested in connection to a theft charge after allegedly using a victim's identification to try to obtain loans.

Sheriff Michael Howell reported that on September 4, a woman came into the Sheriff's Office to report a case of identity theft.

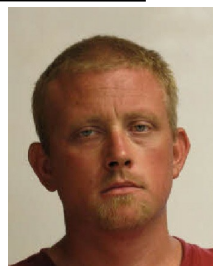
The victim reported that her car had been broken into in the Sylacauga area, and her purse was stolen. She further reported that one of her credit cards had been used in various areas.

The Sheriff's Office investigated the case and developed leads and suspects. They found that 35-year-old Joseph Daniel Mizzell of Childersburg had allegedly applied for loans in the victim's name.

He was arrested on September 10 on the charge of identity theft. His bond was set at \$7,500, and he has since been released on bond to await trial.

A co-defendant in the case, 34-year-old Shellie McClellan of Sylacauga, was arrested on September 15 on the charge of illegal possession of a credit card after she was found to be in possession of the victim's credit card from this case.

Her bond for that charge was set at \$5,000. She remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial for that and other unrelated charges.

A woman and man from Alexander City were arrested on September 6 for assault following a stabbing incident. On August 24, a report was filed with the Sheriff's Office against 22-year-old Alexis Kade Walls.

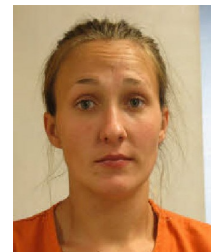
Sheriff Michal Howell explained that Walls was involved in an altercation with an individual, and a knife was pulled out. The victim was stabbed and sustained injuries.

Walls was arrested on the charge of second-degree assault. Additionally, Howell reported that Walls' co-defendant, 23-year-old Billy Wade Lawson, was also arrested for second-degree assault.

The bond for each of them was set at \$5,000, and they have both since been released on bond to await trial.

Sylacauga Duo Arrested for Receipt of Stolen Property

Two Sylacauga men were arrested for allegedly receiving stolen property, with a third arrest possible in the case. The Sheriff's Office took a report on August 12 in reference to items being stolen from the County Road 32 area, close to the rock quarry.

Sheriff Michael Howell reported that on September 2, 21-year-old Shannon Scott was arrested on the charge of first-degree receiving stolen property in that case.

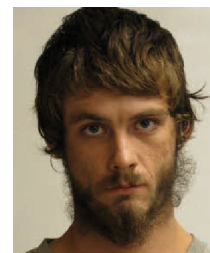
Scott's bond was set at \$7,500, and he has since been released on bond to await trial.

Horn was released from the Coosa County Jail on bond later that same day.



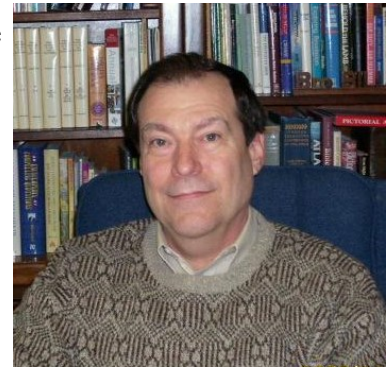

The Yellow Dot Program

The "Yellow Dot" program is designed to assist Alabama citizens and first responders in the event of an automobile crash or other medical emergency involving the participant's vehicle. The program can help save lives during the critical "Golden Hour" by improving communication at a time when accident victims may be unable to communicate for themselves. Pick up a "Yellow Dot" folder here at the Sheriff's Office, have your photo taken and printed.

A "Yellow Dot" decal on the driver's side rear window of a vehicle alerts first responders to check in the glove compartment for the corresponding "Yellow Dot" folder. Having this information following a crash helps first responders positively identify the person, get in touch with family or emergency contacts and ensures that the person's current medications and pre-existing medical conditions are considered when treatment is administered for injuries.



Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver is a radio transmission system designed to assist law enforcement and rescue agencies in locating lost or missing persons who have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, or other disorders that may prohibit them from communicating personal information such as who they are or where they live. Project Lifesaver can help provide peace of mind to caregivers. However, it does not replace the need for supervised care.

The transmitter is a small circular radio device on a wristband, approximately the size of a wristwatch. The transmitters and wristbands are worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and are difficult to remove without the appropriate tools. If the participant becomes lost or missing, the Sheriff's Office and emergency response services have specialized tracking equipment to help isolate the location of the transmitter the participant is wearing. The search will start from the last known location of the participant and work outward until the transmission signal is obtained. The goal is to determine the location of the signal in a quick, timely manner, minimizing the risk of harm to the loved one.

CCSO is proud to participate, along with the other agencies in Alabama, in this very worthy and worthwhile program; Sheriff Howell says this is another way we will live up to our motto, "To Serve and Protect" and he is extremely proud to offer this great service to Coosa County!



Neighborhood Watch Program

A citizen's involvement program where citizens, in cooperation with their local law enforcement agency, directly participate in the detection and prevention of crime. These citizens keep well informed about their neighborhood and of any suspicious, criminal or dangerous activities that may be occurring. Coosa County has five communities that participate with the CCSO in this program. Their meetings are scheduled every month, the dates and times are indicated.
