Identity Theft



What Is Identity Theft?

Identity theft is when someone uses your personal or financial information without your permission.

They might steal your name and address, credit card, or bank account numbers, Social Security number, or medical insurance account numbers. And they could use them to

- buy things with your credit cards
- get new credit cards in your name
- open a phone, electricity, or gas account in your name
- steal your tax refund
- · use your health insurance to get medical care
- pretend to be you if they are arrested

How To Protect Yourself Against Identity Theft

Ask questions before giving out your Social Security number

Some organizations need your Social Security number to identify you. Those organizations include the IRS, your bank, and your employer.

Organizations like these that do need your Social Security number won't call, email, or text you to ask for it. The Coosa County Sheriff's Office will NEVER solicit you for personal information nor will we release personal information such as report info or Warrant information over the phone.

Other organizations that might ask you for your Social Security number might not really need it. Those organizations include a medical provider, a company, or your child's school. Ask these questions before you give them your Social Security number:

• Why do you need it?

- How will you protect it?
- Can you use a different identifier?
- Can you use just the last four digits of my Social Security number?

Protect your information from scammers online and on your phone

If you're logging in to an online account, use a strong password.

Add multi-factor authentication for accounts that offer it. Multi-factor authentication offers extra security by requiring two or more credentials to log in to your account. The additional credentials you need to log in to your account fall into two categories: something you have — like a passcode you get via text message or an authentication app, or something you are — like a scan of your fingerprint, your retina, or your face. Multi-factor authentication makes it harder for scammers to log in to your accounts if they do get your username and password.

Do not give your personal information to someone who calls, emails, or texts you. It could be a scammer trying to steal your information.

What you can do to detect identity theft

Here's what you can do to spot identity theft:

- Track what bills you owe and when they're due. If you stop getting a bill, that could be
 a sign that someone changed your billing address.
- **Review your bills.** Charges for things you didn't buy could be a sign of identity theft. So could a new bill you didn't expect.
- Check your bank account statement. Withdrawals you didn't make could be a sign of identity theft.
- **Get and review your credit reports.** Accounts in your name that you don't recognize could be a sign of identity theft.



Tickets

You have received a dreaded Traffic Violation Citation, a.k.a. "a ticket". Here are some helpful tips towards question(s) we get asked often.

- 1. Yes, of course, you can contest the ticket by attending your given court date. Be sure to bring your ticket with you and if you wish to contest the ticket, any documentation that would support your contention. While you are not allowed to bring a phone into court, you can print out any picture in advance prior to the day of court and bring pictures with you. If you have a video, you can copy it on a disc, and it can be played on a computer in court.
- 2. If you elect to pay your ticket, you have several ways to do so.
 - a. You can go to the county clerk's office on the second floor.
 - b. You can call Toll Free 1-866-954-9399.
 - c. Credit Card Payments Accepted 24 hrs / 7 days a week.
- 3. On a computer or smart device, go to: https://traffic.alacourt.gov
 - a. Pay, resolve, and/or view your ticket.
 - b. You can change your court date.
 - c. You can request to make payment arrangements.
 - d. You can request to take a "Defensive Driver Course"
 - i.**If you have a CDL, or have taken the course before, you cannot take the course unfortunately.

If you have any additional questions regarding your traffic ticket, you can always contact the clerk's office @ 256-377-4988.

As a last safety tip, if you do get pulled over, remember to pull over **to the right** side of the emergency lane, or embankment, as safe as possible.

NEIGHBORHOOD Safety Tips from Sheriff Michael Howell

Summer is here and as excited as we are to be cruising on boats and swimming at the lake that also means that dreaded job is back! Yes... I'm talking about yard work, weed eating especially! Weed eaters are useful and commonly used tools. As with all tools careful operation and following appropriate safety tips helps to manage risks and minimize the chances of personal injury. Check out these tips and tricks to avoid accidents:

- 1) Wear solid shoes, preferably heavy boots, to protect your feet.
- 2) Wear shoes with good traction to minimize the risk of slipping and losing control of your weed eater.
- 3) Wear long pants to protect your legs.
- 4) Wear relatively tight-fitting clothing and tie back long hair. Loose clothing and long hair can get caught in the moving parts of a weed eater.
- 5) Consider wearing work gloves to protect your hands.
- 6) Wear eye protection. For gas powered weed eaters wear ear protection.
- 7) Know how to operate the weed eater. Start by reading the manual.
- 8) Use the correct fuel mixture if the weed eater is gas powered.
- 9) Prior to starting the weed eater make sure the weed eater is in good operating condition and guards are in place.
- 10)Prior to starting the weed eater, clear the area of stones, sticks, wire, and other debris.
- 11)Start the engine on firm ground in an open place for maximum control and best footing possible. Once the engine is running move into a cutting position.
- 12) While weed eating, pay attention to what you are cutting, and what is going on around you. This is especially important next to roads and other sources of activity.
- 13)Stop cutting if someone approaches within 30 to 60 feet to avoid striking them with flying debris.
- 14) When not actually cutting run the engine at an idle.
- 15)Keep the weed eater's cutting part beneath waist, and preferably knee, height.
- 16)Stop the engine prior to setting the weed eater down.
- 17) Turn off the engine and disconnect the spark plug wire when making repairs or working on the weed eater.
- 18)Allow the engine to cool before refueling the weed eater.
- 19) Minimize grass and other debris buildup on the weed eater to minimize the fire hazard.
- 20)After use, secure the weed eater in order to avoid gas spillage and or damage when moving the unit.

ROCKFORD MAN ARRESTED FOR RESISTING ARREST, MORE

A Rockford man was arrested on four charges last month, including resisting arrest, following a response to an emergency call.

Chief Deputy Scott Hammond reported that on April 11, Deputy Payton responded to a call of shots fired on County Road 59 in Rockford. Upon his arrival, Payton saw a male walking and what appeared to be light from a cell phone. After he was dropped off at the jail, Deputy Payton was called back for another incident because Powell had knocked cameras off the cell walls.

Ultimately, on April 12, 37-year-old Justin Cole Powell of Rockford was arrested and charged with destruction of property by a prisoner, resisting arrest, failing to obey a police officer, and obstructing government operations.

His total bond for all four charges was set at \$12,500. He was released on bond on April 23 to await trial.

INMATE ARRESTED ON CONTRABAND CHARGE FOR DRUGS

An inmate was arrested Monday on a contraband charge following a drug test. Chief Deputy Scott Hammond reported that on May 2 deputies were called to the Sheriff's Office because of two inmates testing positive for controlled substances after being given random drug tests. The inmates were searched prior to being put on lockdown, and numerous contraband items were found in one of the inmate's cells. The case was turned over to Investigations. MAN ARRESTED ON MULTIPLE DRUG CHARGES FOLLOWING TRAFFIC STOP

A traffic stop ultimately led to an arrest Tuesday on multiple drugrelated and other charges.

Chief Deputy Scott Hammond reported that on May 13, deputies Brown and Payton conducted a traffic stop in the Stewartville area. They approached the vehicle, which had a driver and passenger inside, and asked for driver's identification.

The passenger gave false identification to the deputies, and because the name provided was not on file with dispatch, he was detained. Deputies asked for permission to search the vehicle, and permission was given. That search led to locating a black pouch holding cotton balls that had been injected with methamphetamine, loaded needles and a container of a clear crystal-like substance, as well as three more loaded needles. The deputies also found the individual's real identification during the search, Ultimately, 35-year-old Justis Wayne Stillwell, who had no address provided and said he was homeless, was arrested. Stillwell was charged with two counts of possession of a controlled substance, obstructing justice using false identification and possession of drug paraphernalia. It was also discovered that he has multiple outstanding warrants with several other law enforcement agencies in the state. Stillwell's total bond for all four of Tuesday's charges was set at \$17,500. As of press time he remained in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.



Remember The Alamo

No, I did not fight at the Alamo, at least not in Texas. I arrived a little too late and missed it by at least a few decades. I did, however, visit the Alamo, and I was quite glad there was no fighting going on there at that time. I was quite surprised at how small it is. I do remember

the Alamo because I've read all about it and I've seen the movies. I remember Jim Bowie, William B. Travis, Davy Crocket, and John Wayne (oh, that was in a movie). I even remember Santa Anna. As a boy, I played the role of many of those defenders in my own back yard in Alabama. The Texans won in my versions!

In the movies they all looked larger than life. The Alamo Mission looked much larger than it actually is, as I discovered when I toured it in person. Even though the mission site was not so large, the battle itself was enormous. The battle for Texas to win independence from Mexico in 1836 lasted 13 days. Yes, you are right, the Texans did not win that battle, but that would not be the last one. The Texans and their allies were garrisoned at the Alamo Mission when Mexican forces, which outnumbered the defenders several times over, approached. The defenders held off the first-and-second waves of attackers, but the Mexican forces eventually proved to be too strong for them. They put up a courageous battle but were outnumbered and ultimately overpowered and defeated. Some ten-years later, in the Mexican-American War, a popular battle cry had arisen that encouraged and empowered the American soldiers. That cry was "Remember the Alamo!"

This Memorial Day weekend, may we not only remember the Alamo and those who died for Texas' independence. May we also remember all the battles and wars and all who died to gain and keep our independence as a nation. We are more than simply one state that is free, or even a number of states that are free, we are the United States of America! May we remember all those who have died, those who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom. May we remember those brave patriots who died for our initial freedom from England in the Revolutionary War. The courage and bravery to rise up in rebellion against their mother country was seen as an egregious act of treason by England. Their resistance gave rise to a war that many believed couldn't possibly be won by the ill trained and equipped colonists. According to some records 4,435 colonists died on the battlefields during the Revolution, but we won our independence. Since the Revolutionary War, according to some figures and they vary, some 2,260 Americans died in the War of 1812; 13,283 died in the Mexican War (1846-1848); 620,000 (Union and Confederate) died in the Civil War (1861-1865); 2,446 died in the Spanish-American War (1898); 116,516 died in World War I (1914-1918); 405,399 died in World War II (1941-1945);

36,574 died in the Korean War (1950-1953); 58,220 died in the Vietnam War (1964-1973); and 383 died in the Persian Gulf War (1990-1991). During and since The War on Terror that began on September 11, 2001 many others have died.

Although we have picnics, cookouts, swim parties, and many other fun activities, Memorial Day is in fact a somber holiday. May we enjoy the holiday, but may we never forget those who gave so we can. May we not only "Remember the Alamo," but all the other battles and wars as well and those who died in them. Happy Memorial Day!





The Yellow Dot Program

The "Yellow Dot" program is designed to assist Alabama citizens and first responders in the event of an automobile crash or other medical emergency involving the participant's vehicle. The program can help save lives during the critical "Golden Hour" by improving communication at a time when accident victims may be unable to communicate for themselves. Pick up a "Yellow Dot" folder here at the Sheriff's Office, have your photo taken and printed.

A "Yellow Dot" decal on the driver's side rear window of a vehicle alerts first responders to check in the glove compartment for the corresponding "Yellow Dot" folder. Having this information following a crash helps first responders positively identify the person, get in touch with family or emergency contacts and ensures that the person's current medications and pre-existing medical conditions are considered when treatment is administered for

<u>Project Lifesaver</u>

Project Lifesaver is a radio transmission system designed to assist law enforcement and rescue agencies in locating lost or missing persons who have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, or other disorders that may prohibit them from communicating personal information such as who they are or where they live. Project lifesaver can help provide peace of mind to caregivers. However, it does not replace the need for supervised care.

The transmitter is a small circular radio device on a wristband, approximately the size of a wristwatch. The transmitters and wristbands are worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and are difficult to remove without the appropriate tools. If the participant becomes lost or missing, the Sheriff's Office and emergency response services have specialized tracking equipment to help isolate the location of the transmitter the participant is wearing. The search will start from the last known location of the participant and work outward until the transmission signal is obtained. The goal is to determine the location of the signal in a quick, timely manner, minimizing the risk of harm to the loved one.

CCSO is proud to participate, along with the other agencies in Alabama, in this very worthy and worthwhile program; Sheriff Howell says this is another way we will live up to out motto, "To Serve and Protect" and he is

<u>Neighborhood Watch Program</u>

A citizen's involvement program where citizens, in cooperation with their local law enforcement agency, directly participate in the detection and prevention of crime. These citizens keep well informed about their neighborhood and of any suspicious, criminal or dangerous activities that may be occurring. Coosa County has five communities that participate with the CCSO in this program. Their meetings are scheduled every month, the dates and times are indicated.
