Last month we shared one of my favorite verses in the scripture, Romans 12:2 that says, “Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.”

We looked at what it means not to be conformed to what this world looks like. This month I wanted to look at the next key word in the verse, transformed. The actual word there is metamorphoo, where we get our English word metamorphosis. It reminds me of a story from when I was a kid. We used to have mud holes in our yard and every spring when the rain came these mudholes would be full of tadpoles. Once I had a great idea, I brought some tadpoles into the house and put them in my fish tank. The neat thing was that I could feed them fish food and they loved it. They would swim around, and I thought it was great. After a few weeks they would develop back legs and then front legs. All of a sudden, they didn't look like tadpoles anymore, but they looked like frogs. Eventually they wouldn't swim anymore, and they required more to eat than the fish food so I took them outside so they could eat bugs like they were designed to do.

When we look at this it helps us to understand what being transformed looks like. The tadpoles looked like fish. They swam like fish. They even ate fish food. However, the whole time inside of them they were truly frogs, and what was on the inside had to be revealed on the outside. As a Christian we are called to be transformed. Even though we live in the world, work in the world, and even partake of the things of the world, there is a Holy Spirit that lives inside of us. We are urged to allow the Holy Spirit to transform us so that what is on the inside can be revealed on the outside. I encourage you to take a moment and ask yourself if you find yourself conforming to the world around you or are you being transformed by the Spirit that lives inside of you.

Safety Tips for Controlled Burns

Spring is here and some homeowners burn their lawns in early spring to de-thatch, get rid of any weeds, and rid their lawn of diseases and insects. Controlled burns can be very beneficial for landowners. If you have a larger yard than most, a controlled burn can be cheaper and less labor intensive than other land management tactics such as chemicals or mowing. Controlled burns rejuvenate native grasses while reducing undesirable weeds.

TIPS FOR A CONTROLLED BURN

Controlled burns are an efficient, cost-effective way to manage your yard but even with all the right training and tools, a controlled burn has the potential to be dangerous. Below are a few tips to keep in mind to keep you, your home and those around you safe during a controlled burn.

- **Is now a good time to burn?** Each season brings its own risks and benefits with controlled burns. Consider consulting with your local fire departments and forestry personnel before you plan to burn.
- **Call before you burn.** Notify your local fire department when and where you plan to have a controlled burn.
- **Keep a watchful eye.** Have at least one person attending by the fire until its put out.
- **Be ready to put it out.** Have a garden hose connected to a water supply or other fire-extinguishing resources available to prevent the spread of the fire.

What is Memorial Day?

The history of Memorial Day goes back to the 19th century. People who lost their friends and relatives in the Civil War started to decorate the graves of their dead with flowers, wreaths, and flags. That is why the initial name of the holiday was Decoration Day. After World War I, all Americans adopted this remembrance tradition of the Southern states and devoted it to all those who died in any military action. We are honoring men and women who gave their lives for our country up to now. Today people go to cemeteries to decorate the graves and pay homage to their dead. Many Americans spend Memorial Day getting together with their family for a picnic or sports event.

What is the Difference between Memorial Day and Veterans Day?

Make Mental Health a Priority

With May being Mental Health Awareness month, this is a perfect time to highlight the importance of approach tactics Law Enforcement Officers (LEO) use with individuals possibly suffering from mental illnesses. It is extremely important for LEO's to "slow down" and take their time to assess each situation when responding to each dispatched call. Rushing through a situation could cause an already tense situation to become even more dangerous. It is important to not "talk cop". Society has a preconceived notion all LEO's are rude, bossy, and have a lack of empathy which is not the case. They simply have a protocol that must be followed. With that being said, here are a few tips Coosa County Sheriff's Office Deputies follow when coming in contact with subjects who could possibly be suffering from a mental illness:

- When arriving at the scene of a mental health call, if circumstances allow, slow down.
- Take your time to listen to the subject's story and attempt to find a peaceful resolution.
- Barking orders and giving demands to someone who is already agitated will only exacerbate the situation.
- Do not use "cop talk." Be empathetic to the subject, and communicate with the subject to build rapport.

Coosa County Sheriff's Office Deputies understand the need to take their time, if the situation allows, to assess each call accordingly. Building respect and using logic opposed to conflict and resistance is true success.

National Correctional Officers Week is a great opportunity for those working in corrections to reflect on the job that they do and the value that their career provides to public safety. It's also an opportunity for those who don't work in corrections to reflect on the value of an area of the criminal justice system that's often forgotten.

The inherent risk of working in corrections may seem obvious considering the backgrounds of many of those housed within jail and prison facilities. However, these risks are often masked from the public, which rarely sees or hears about the hundreds or thousands of staff assaults that take place each week in correctional facilities across this country.

The view that most Americans have of the correctional system comes from exposure to movies and TV shows where the prison culture is often sensationalized and where corrections staff are frequently portrayed as villains rather than the heroes they actually are.

Prison assaults on staff are rarely in the full view of the media and are often handled through an internal administrative disciplinary process. It's likely that, even if they received coverage in the media, assaults on corrections staff would eventually become "white noise" to the public as the frequency of violent acts carried out on jail and prison staff would occupy entire news segments on a daily basis. This fact is not a reason to ignore the job of corrections, instead, it is the very reason that we should celebrate those working within the profession.

A CRITICAL ROLE IN PUBLIC SAFETY

The role that corrections plays in public safety is among the most important that exists. Prisons and jails are tasked with housing those who have violated society's norms or those society fears present a threat to the public. Once locked away, even the most violent criminals are often erased from the public's memory. The thought is that once confined, these perpetrators will never again present a threat to the public. Never again to present a threat – except to those tasked with working around them each day.



The Yellow Dot Program

The "Yellow Dot" program is designed to assist Alabama citizens and first responders in the event of an automobile crash or other medical emergency involving the participant's vehicle. The program can help save lives during the critical "Golden Hour" by improving communication at a time when accident victims may be unable to communicate for themselves. Pick up a "Yellow Dot" folder here at the Sheriff's Office, have your photo taken and printed.

A "Yellow Dot" decal on the driver's side rear window of a vehicle alerts first responders to check in the glove compartment for the corresponding "Yellow Dot" folder. Having this information following a crash helps first responders positively identify the person, get in touch with family or emergency contacts and ensures that the person's current medications and pre-existing medical conditions are considered when treatment is administered for



Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver is a radio transmission system designed to assist law enforcement and rescue agencies in locating lost or missing persons who have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, or other disorders that may prohibit them from communicating personal information such as who they are or where they live. Project lifesaver can help provide peace of mind to caregivers. However, it does not replace the need for supervised care.

The transmitter is a small circular radio device on a wristband, approximately the size of a wristwatch. The transmitters and wristbands are worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and are difficult to remove without the appropriate tools. If the participant becomes lost or missing, the Sheriff's Office and emergency response services have specialized tracking equipment to help isolate the location of the transmitter the participant is wearing. The search will start from the last known location of the participant and work outward until the transmission signal is obtained. The goal is to determine the location of the signal in a quick, timely manner, minimizing the risk of harm to the loved one.

CCSO is proud to participate, along with the other agencies in Alabama, in this very worthy and worthwhile program; Sheriff Howell says this is another way we will live up to our motto, "To Serve and Protect" and he is



Neighborhood Watch Program

A citizen's involvement program where citizens, in cooperation with their local law enforcement agency, directly participate in the detection and prevention of crime. These citizens keep well informed about their neighborhood and of any suspicious, criminal or dangerous activities that may be occurring. Coosa County has five communities that participate with the CCSO in this program. Their meetings are scheduled every month, the dates and times are indicated.
