Tips for throwing a safe football party

It's that time of year folks: College football season!! Everyone loves a party with friends to watch the big game and some like to enjoy a nice cold one— just don't forget to nominate a designated driver. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration , approximately 34 people in the United States die per day in drunk driving crashes— that's 1 person every 42 minutes!!! While final data is not available for year 2024 yet, it will surpass 12,000 deaths in this type of crash for the entire year. Big games and playoffs are more fun when friends get together to watch them so planning ahead is a good defense. Below are a few tips to help keep you and your guests safe:

- Make the hard calls for safety. Throw out the yellow flag if someone has been drinking and tries to leave with keys in their hand— that's a party foul.
- Know your MVPs. Give the designated drivers the best seat in the house and make sure they have plenty of alcohol free choices.
- At the beginning of the 4th quarter, consider replacing alcoholic drinks with coffee, water and desserts.



LET'S GO OUT TO EAT

Back when I was growing up, if Mama said, "Let's go out to eat," we did not head for the car. We weren't going anywhere. She literally meant out...as in outside...as in not in the house. I could count on my digits the number of times my family went out to a restaurant. I could probably do so without needing to take off my shoes! That was true for two reasons: One was because

back then, in my small hometown of Rainsville, there was hardly anywhere to go out to eat. There are all kinds of restaurants and fast-food places there now, but only a couple of locally-owned places back then. The other reason was because it costed money and we had more home-grown food than we had money!

When Mama said, "Let's go out to eat," she meant out on the front porch or out under the shade trees. We often did that in the cool-of-the-day for dinner (or supper, as it was known in the South back then). Because we didn't have air-conditioning, it was often cooler outside than inside the house. On special occasions, we even cooked out there on our portable aluminum charcoal grill. Mama liked that because it didn't heat up the house like the oven did. On those rare occasions when we did go out to a restaurant, it was King's. We King's went to the other King's restaurant, but they were not kin to us. Actually, my set of King's had their own little café, complete with a couple of bowling lanes, right there in Rainsville. I don't remember that because I had not surprised them with my presence yet. By the time I arrived, they had gotten out of that business. Maybe the memory of running a café was another reason they didn't want to eat out.

The other King's place started out as a drive-up dairy bar. We didn't have a Dairy Queen in Rainsville, but we had a Dari-King. They had great hamburgers and milkshakes, but they didn't have inside seating. It became a hangout for local teenagers. We cruised, but mostly in circles around the Dari-King building. Maybe to stop our cruising they blocked our path by adding a sit-down restaurant to the building. The Dari King was transformed into King's Restaurant. They still had those hamburgers, but they also had full meals, including wonderful roasted chicken and salad. When I became old enough to drive, and was making my own money, I ate there quite often.

Before long other cafes began to open up. We had Bud's Ranch House, The Greek Gardens, and eventually Betty's BBQ. Then we discovered if we ventured way on out of town there was another place between Rainsville and Fort Payne called Pine Ridge Café. It must have been a full five miles from my house. It sat right on the side of Highway 35, and looked like it might tumble off in the ditch behind it.

They cooked a mean country breakfast plus scrumptious hamburger steaks and fried chicken livers at lunch and dinner.

It saddens me to say, that all those places now exist only in my mind. As the saying goes, all good things must come to an end...well, that is except heaven. A Sonic now sets where the Dari-King once reigned.

These days, I live in Opelika/Auburn and we have so many places to eat that I couldn't even name them all. My favorite place of them all is under our own roof. We have wonderful home-cooked meals and a big back porch...if we want to go out to eat!

KARMA

K9 Karma succumbed to complications from heatstroke after pursuing two drug suspects near 329th Ave NW and Magnolia St NW in Cambridge on August 7, 2025.

The Isanti County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the East Central Drug and Violent Offenders Task Force, was executing a search warrant at a suspected drug residence. Two suspects fled the scene, resulting in a vehicle pursuit. When the suspect's car crashed, and the suspects fled on foot, K9 Karma was deployed. When K9 Karma started experiencing signs of distress, he was taken to a treatment facility. His condition deteriorated rapidly, and K9 Karma passed away the next day.

The two suspects were apprehended and released on bond.

K9 Karma had served with the Isanti County Sheriff's Office for two years.







DRUG BUST NETS THREE ROCKFORD ARRESTS

A recent investigation culminated in the arrests of three Rockford residents on drug-related charges, thanks to a combined effort of multiple agencies.

Chief Deputy Scott Hammond reported that on Monday, July 28, a search warrant was conducted at a residence on Alabama Highway 22 regarding the sell of methamphetamine.


Sgt. Travis Ward and his Special Response Team, or SRT, was deployed to execute the search warrant.

While conducting the search warrant, the SRT came in contact with four individuals inside the residence. After identifying the individuals, the investigation culminated in the arrests of three individuals. Jesse Lewis Leonard Jr., 63 years old, was arrested and charged with two counts of unlawful distribution of a controlled substance, possession of a controlled substance, first-degree possession of marijuana, and possession of drug paraphernalia.


Anna Victoria Linto, 29 years old, was arrested on charges of possession of a controlled substance, second-degree possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia. There were no charges on the fourth individual in the residence, who was not arrested. Leonard is being held with no bond and remains in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial.

Linto and Bonner each received a total bond of \$10,000 for their respective charges. As of press time, both remained in custody at the Coosa County Jail awaiting trial. The Sheriff's Office thanks agencies who assisted in the investigation and executing the search warrant, which included Sheriff's Office personnel, Alabama Law Enforcement Agency's Alabama Drug Enforcement Task Force, Rockford Police Department, Kellyton SRT medic, and Alabaster Police Department. "This case has been worked

diligently over the past couple of weeks, and I would like to thank all agencies for their assistance," Sheriff Michael Howell said.


ROCKFORD WOMAN ARRESTED FOR FALSE 911 CALLS

Thank you to students, staff, parents, and community members for making the first day back to school a positive experience for our students. The 2025-2026 school year is off to a great start, and we are very excited about everything in store for the new school year.



The Yellow Dot Program

The "Yellow Dot" program is designed to assist Alabama citizens and first responders in the event of an automobile crash or other medical emergency involving the participant's vehicle. The program can help save lives during the critical "Golden Hour" by improving communication at a time when accident victims may be unable to communicate for themselves. Pick up a "Yellow Dot" folder here at the Sheriff's Office, have your photo taken and printed.

A "Yellow Dot" decal on the driver's side rear window of a vehicle alerts first responders to check in the glove compartment for the corresponding "Yellow Dot" folder. Having this information following a crash helps first responders positively identify the person, get in touch with family or emergency contacts and ensures that the person's current medications and pre-existing medical conditions are considered when treatment is administered for



Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver is a radio transmission system designed to assist law enforcement and rescue agencies in locating lost or missing persons who have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, Autism, Dementia, or other disorders that may prohibit them from communicating personal information such as who they are or where they live. Project Lifesaver can help provide peace of mind to caregivers. However, it does not replace the need for supervised care.

The transmitter is a small circular radio device on a wristband, approximately the size of a wristwatch. The transmitters and wristbands are worn 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and are difficult to remove without the appropriate tools. If the participant becomes lost or missing, the Sheriff's Office and emergency response services have specialized tracking equipment to help isolate the location of the transmitter the participant is wearing. The search will start from the last known location of the participant and work outward until the transmission signal is obtained. The goal is to determine the location of the signal in a quick, timely manner, minimizing the risk of harm to the loved one.

CCSO is proud to participate, along with the other agencies in Alabama, in this very worthy and worthwhile program; Sheriff Howell says this is another way we will live up to our motto, "To Serve and Protect" and he is



Neighborhood Watch Program

A citizen's involvement program where citizens, in cooperation with their local law enforcement agency, directly participate in the detection and prevention of crime. These citizens keep well informed about their neighborhood and of any suspicious, criminal or dangerous activities that may be occurring. Coosa County has five communities that participate with the CCSO in this program. Their meetings are scheduled every month, the dates and times are indicated.
